Bishop's message

"But when He saw the multitudes, He was moved with compassion for them, because they were weary and scattered, like sheep having no shepherd." (Matthew 9:36) Jesus grieved alongside the people because "to suffer with" is the definition of the term "compassion." We devote the entire month of June to learning about and imitating Jesus' compassionate heart in order to become more like him. As Jesus' followers, we should embody the compassionate man. We must strive to be merciful, compassionate, and just instead of confining our devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus to our personal devotion.

Jesus himself demonstrates for us numerous unconventional methods to exhibit compassion for others. Here are three essential techniques for having compassion like Jesus.

1. Physical Compassion

When Jesus saw the physical needs of others and had compassion on them. "I have compassion on the multitude, because they have now continued with me three days and have nothing to eat." (Mark 8:2) There wasn't enough food for the hundreds of people to survive on over the three days that they spent listening to Jesus' teachings. How does Jesus respond? Compassion. Food is such a fundamental human need, and the

world's Savior was concerned when this need wasn't being met. Jesus steps in to help and does a miracle. Please notice that compassion was the driving force behind Jesus' miracle. We have frequently concentrated on the miracle of Jesus feeding the multitude while ignoring the minor but crucial aspect of his motivation. Although Jesus' primary mission was to save our souls, he also showed compassion for those in need of bodily care. By attending to others' physical needs, I as well as you can demonstrate compassion. No matter how big the need seems, your compassion should compel you to attend to others' bodily needs.

2. Emotional Compassion

Jesus modeled emotional compassion, but we don't see it because we're in awe of the miracle.

As he approached the town gate, a dead person was being carried outthe only son of his mother, and she was a widow. And a large crowd from the town was with her. When the Lord saw her, his heart went out to her and he said, "Don't cry." (Luke 7:12-13)

The boy had already passed away at this point, and as you may expect, his mother was utterly heartbroken. According to the Bible, Jesus had compassion on the mother rather than the boy. He felt sympathy for her and the recent loss she had gone through. We all know how hard it is to lose a loved one since we have gone through it. Once more, his sympathy for this mother inspired him to work a miracle. He attended to her emotional need. This may be among the trickiest methods for us to show compassion for others. We must pause; pay attention to someone's needs, and be present with them in order to meet their emotional needs. It isn't as. It's not as easy as buying someone a pair of shoes or a meal for the holidays.

3. Spiritual Compassion

The good news of Jesus centers on his concern for people's spiritual needs. Salvation is what Jesus came to bring. That is a soul issue. Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." (Matthew 9:35-38)

Jesus wasn't just carrying out his mission. He was really distressed by the spiritual state of the people he encountered. In this situation, Jesus felt compassion for their spiritual condition because they were being misled. We should undoubtedly be concerned about individuals who have not found salvation if we are to exhibit compassion for others' spiritual needs. But we should likewise be concerned with the spiritual requirements of the rescued. We don't frequently believe we can be of assistance in this or other areas of someone's life. We must therefore maintain relationships with others in order to be able to recognize when they are experiencing spiritual difficulty. The body of Christ is meant to function as this for one another. We ought to be close enough to people to be aware of their spiritual struggles and compassionate enough to support them when necessary.

Jesus provided a compassionate role model for us to follow. He attended to the needs of others on a physical, emotional, and spiritual level. He was concerned about the individual as whole, not just some parts of them. We ought to comprehend biblical compassion holistically rather than limiting it to just one of these areas. Your compassion for others is a sign of your love for Jesus.

CCBI LAITY COMMISSION Bengal Regional SEMINAR from May 28th to 31st 2023

Regional Laity Conference West Bengal Chapter

The much-awaited regional conference of the West Bengal State Level Laity Commission was held on May 28th and 31st at Divyavani Pastoral Centre, Darjeeling, it was basically a two day Training (29th & 30th May) programme for lay leaders, initiated by Catholic Conference of Bishops in India (CCBI) and the Theme was Lay Leadership in the Indian Church. Five lay delegates from each of the eight dioceses of Bengal (i.e. Calcutta, Baruipur, Darjeeling, Bagdogra, Krishnanagar, Asansol, Jalpaiguri and Raiganj) were invited to the conference by Mr. Sameer Lahiri, Regional Secretary of West Bengal. However, instead of 40, a total of 15 delegates from four dioceses turned up at the venue to deliberate on issues concerning Laity. On the second day, 20 lay leaders from Darjeeling, the host diocese, joined in the deliberations for the first half of the day and made the session livelier.

Post Vatican II declaration, subsequent to the Holy See and higher authorities of the Catholic Church, it has been repeatedly emphasized on the importance and role of the lay Christians for their spiritual and all-round development of the Church. In the Nineteenth century, the designated role of lay people was insignificant limiting to Pray, Pay and Obey. Today with increasing education and professional expertise, ordinary Catholics have come out of their shell and are effectively contributing to the church in all spheres of spiritual, social, economical, and cultural growth.

Mr. Rajen Bannerjee from Darjeeling, Mr. Dilip Rozario and his team from Kolkata, Mr. Sameer Lahiri and his team from Krishnanagar, and Mr. Biswajit Mukherjee & his team from Baruipur, eloquently expressed their views to ensure better functioning of laity organizations, all were thoroughly motivated and remained alive. Two lively youths from ICYM, Calcutta, Ms. Akansha Kerketta & Leo Kundu enlivened the sessions with their well-thought-out views and Action Songs. The entire event was held under the auspices of Rt. Rev. Bishop Stephen Lepcha of Darjeeling Diocese. His homilies during each day's Eucharist were very lucid and meaningful and exhorted the common people to be always positive. He further stated that the role of lay people in the Church must be committed without seeking position and popularity but with the dedication of a Servant Leader. The Bishop besides hosting the Convention announced that all expenses for the entire event would be borne by Darjeeling Diocese, proving once again his exemplary generosity. The entire participants appreciated the contribution of Mr. Rajen Bannerjee's unprecedented logistical arrangements and event management which would be forever remembered by all who attended the seminar. There have been many such discussion camps of lay leaders in the past and there will be more in the future but it remains to be seen how many more such conventions need to be organized to make the church realize that without laity empowerment and its spontaneous participation, the Catholic Church will not grow in the spirit of the Vatican II whose recommendations have not been implemented by the Church Hierarchy even after 50 years. Soon there might be demand for Vatican III!
