The key elements of the Jubilee Year are as follows:

Jubilee Year: In the Catholic tradition, a Jubilee Year, or Holy Year, is a time of special graces, prayer, and pilgrimage. It usually involves the opening of the Holy Doors

of the major basilicas in Rome, symbolizing a path to salvation. The 2025 Jubilee is particularly significant as it marks a quarter-century since the Great Jubilee of 2000.

Pilgrim of Hope: This theme emphasizes the journey of faith that Catholics are invited to undertake. Being a pilgrim of hope means moving forward with trust in God's promises, embracing the future with optimism, and being a witness of hope in the world.

Synodal Journey :The synodal process initiated by Pope Francis is about deepening the Church's commitment to synodality, which means "journeying together." This process involves listening, dialogue, and communal discernment. It aims to foster greater participation and co-responsibility among all members of the Church.

Connection between Jubilee and Synodality: The Jubilee's theme of hope and pilarimage alians with the synodal journey's emphasis on communal discernment and participation. As pilgrims of hope, the faithful are called to walk together, listen to one another, and discern the paths the Church should take to be a sign of hope in the world.

In essence, "Jubilee: Pilgrim of Hope on the Synodal Journey" highlights the call for Catholics to engage deeply in their faith journey, fostering hope and unity within the Church and the broader world through a spirit of pilgrimage and synodal collaboration.

Church and Media in the light of INTER MIRIFICA



Vatican II addressed social communication in the document Inter Mirifica ("Among the Wonderful"), which was promulgated on December 4, 1963. Here are some key points from this document:

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Recognition of Modern Media: The council acknowledged the profound impact of modern communication tools such as the press, movies, radio, and television on society.

Moral Responsibility: It emphasized the moral responsibilities of those who work in the media industry, highlighting the need for media to respect truth, justice, and human dianity.

Role of the Church: The Church's role in media was stressed. encouraging the faithful to actively engage with media in a way that promotes Christian values. The document called for the establishment of special training and formation programs for those in the Church who work in media.

Public Authorities: It called on public authorities to ensure that media serves the common good and respects moral norms.

Audience's Responsibility: It pointed out the responsibilities of the audience, encouraging them to consume media critically and responsibly.

Promotion of Good Media: The document urged the promotion of media content that aligns with Christian values and contributes positively to society.

World Communications Day: One practical outcome of Inter Mirifica was the establishment of World Communications Day, which is celebrated annually by the Church to reflect on the opportunities

and challenges of social communication.

Inter Mirifica was one of the initial steps by the Catholic Church to formally engage with the rapidly evolving field of social communication and to provide guidance on its ethical use.



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A CENTURY OF SHAPING YOUNG MINDS- ST. JOSEPH'S CONVENT

Kalimpong over the ages has been called by different names- some have called it the Nest of smile, some have labeled it the orchid town while others once called it the gateway to Tibet. In my opinion Temple of knowledge would be the apt name for this beautiful

town, for this town has excelled in the art of educating young minds.

This town boasts of several historical educational institutes who have had illustrious pasts and are well known across the region. Dr. Graham Homes, SUMI, St Augustine's School are some of the better known one but one school which has gone about its way, without any fuss, without any noise, without any publicity and worked with the utmost dedication and sincerity towards not just educating several generations of students but towards shepherding our society towards a better tomorrow, is the jewel in Kalimpong's crown-St Joseph's Convent.

Established in 1926, by the sisters of St Joseph's of Cluny, in times when female educations was still looked down upon, in this part of the world, the vision of the founding sisters of this temple of knowledge, has provided inspiration and motivation to hundreds of future teachers and administrators of this great institution to take this school to greater heights. On the threshold of completing a century of dedicated service, St Joseph's Convent stands on that decorated platform on which very few schools in India can hope to find a place on.

While many schools not just in Kalimpong but across the region have completed a century of existence, St Joseph's Convent, stands on a pedestal very different from most because of its emphasis on quality value education and emphasis on character building. Ever since those saintly brave heart sisters of Cluny envisioned the concept of this school in Kalimpong, educating young minds who would fashion a new progressive society was the top most priority of this school.

This history of this school and the Catholic community in Kalimpong is one of dedication, struggle, grit, and deep passion towards creating a society that was educated, progressive with women being equal partners in it.

The pioneers of the Catholic community in Kalimpong were of course great souls like Father Desgodins, Father Mussot, Father Douenel and Father Hervagault who made Pedong their initial base under immense hardships and challenges and later spread their field of services to surrounding areas like Kalimpong, Maria Busty, Kagay and Gitdabling. With their untiring and dedicated efforts, the Catholic community in Kalimpong grew in leaps and bounds, and by the mid of the 20th century, it had established itself as a vibrant and popular community in Kalimpong.

Their popularity was not by chance- they worked their way into the hearts of the people in Kalimpong with their indefatigable work in the field of education, health and child care. St Joseph's Convent was one such effort of the Catholic pioneers in Kalimpong.

The initial reluctance of Mother Ursala, Mother Superior of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Cluny, based in Chandannagar (near

Kolkata), to start an educational center in Kalimpong, later turned into a missionary passion for the sisters of St. Joseph of Cluny. After receiving a land grant of 1.85 acres from the SDO, Kalimpong, on the 23rd of July 1920, the construction of the school started in December 1921. Mother Ursala bore the entire expense of Rs. 1,25,000.00, which she collected by literally begging for donations from friends, well-wishers, and the entire Catholic community in Kolkata. Father Douenel and later Father Durel supervised the construction work, and with 65 to 70 workers and 10 Chinese carpenters working on the project, the ground and first floor of the school was completed by May 1922. By March 1923, the construction was completed. The SDO Kalimpong, excited at the prospect of seeing a Catholic school open in Kalimpong, granted a further one acre of land for a playground and the free use of water.

The St Joseph's Convent made a humble beginning on the 15th of July 1926 with just three boarding and seven day scholars. The reputation of this new school grew rapidly, and by the next three years, there were already 60 boarders with six sisters and two other teachers guiding children. On the 3rd of August 1931, St Joseph's Convent received permanent recognition as a secondary school.

From this humble beginning, St Joseph's Covent is today one of the premier institutes in not just Kalimpong but across the region with an international reputation. It has positioned itself as a school that is different, which besides giving topmost priority to total character construction of its students also strives for academic excellence.

The current school administration under the able leadership of Sister Mary James is ushering in a new era in which students are kept abreast of the latest trends in international education. Her modern approach towards education is not only making learning less stressful for the students but also helps them realize their social and community responsibilities. Innovative ideas like "stress buster sessions" every Wednesday afternoons, two "break-times" of 10 minutes, one each in the morning and the afternoon, swimming sessions for boarders every weekend, celebration of grandparents day, playing of soothing music as the school starts, striving to make the school into a zero waste institution and various other such visionary idea have been introduced in the school not just so that learning is fun but more so to inculcate a sense of bonding amongst the students. Another innovative idea that has been implemented is the nature walks that the students are taken on. On these nature walks, the students are guided by the

accompanying teachers of the fine art of harmonizing with nature, identifying medicinal plants, and classifying various varieties of flowers and trees. The students also clean the road and drains of garbage and plastic as they enjoy their walk.

The current administration believes that St Joseph's Convent can not be an island but is very much a part of this community, and it needs to teach students the value of community service. Activities like cleaning of drains and roads of Kalimpong, donation of necessary items to students of St. Mary's school for the hearing impaired and also to the students of Mary Scott School for the visually impaired, visits to old age homes etc have all added towards the values and ethics of the current set of students. All these innovative character building initiatives are sure to inculcate strong moral and social values in the students.

On the threshold of completing a hundred years of service, St Joseph's Convent, is raising the bar of quality education to newer heights which not just proves its commitment towards education but more so it determination to see a society which is educated, morally upright and socially conscious.

In a time and era where corporates are trying to turn education into just another money spinning industry, the 100 years of St. Jospeh's Convent have been spent curating a generation of students with love, dedication, selfless toil and a single-minded focus on the holistic upbringing of students who have been lucky enough to have their futures shaped in this shrine of learning.

Just as the melodious School Song of St. Joseph's Convent says, "Deep in the valley by a swift flowing river, Stands dear St. Joseph's the School we all love" every admirer, student and well-wisher of St Joseph's Convent prays and hope that this great institution continues to serve love, knowledge, discipline and lifelessons to many more generations, standing in the same deep valley by the swift flowing river.
