The Chrism Mass, a significant liturgical celebration in the Catholic calendar, was solemnly held at St. Teresa's Church, Kalimpong, on 10th April 2025. The Most Rev. Bishop Stephen Lepcha, Bishop of the Diocese of Darjeeling, was the principal celebrant of the Eucharistic celebration, joined by priests from across the diocese.

The church was filled with faithful parishioners, religious, and lay representatives from various parishes, all gathered to witness this important moment of unity and renewal. The Mass was preceded by a very meaningful sharing of faith and hope by Fr . Andrew and Sister Sherlyn ardent members of the Focolare movement. ## Report of the Weeklong PR Course at NISCORT

Conducted by: Fr. Cyril, Fr. Robin, and Fr. Biju Venue: NISCORT Media College Duration: One Week

#### **Overview:**

The weeklong PR course conducted at NISCORT was a comprehensive and enriching program designed to introduce participants to the fundamentals and practical dimensions of Public Relations, especially in the context of Church communication and media ministry. The sessions were



facilitated by Fr. Cyril, Fr. Robin, and Fr. Biju all seasoned professionals in the field of media, communication, and ecclesial PR.

#### **Content & Structure:**

- The course was well-structured, with each day focusing on key aspects of PR including:
- Introduction to Public Relations: Definitions, importance, and the role of PR in the Church.

#### Writing for PR:

Press releases, speeches, and official communications.

#### Media Management:

 Dealing with media during crises and promoting Church events.

#### **Event Management and Protocols:**

- Planning, organizing, and executing Church-related events.
- Case Studies and Role Plays: Practical sessions based on real-life scenarios.

#### **Facilitators' Input:**

 Fr. Cyril offered deep insights into Church communication strategies and the theological

underpinnings of PR.

 Fr. Robin brought in his experience with grassroots communication and community outreach, emphasizing ethical and pastoral dimensions.



 Fr. Biju focused on media tools, crisis communication, and the technical side of PR, including visual storytelling and branding.

#### Methodology:

The facilitators used a variety of engaging teaching methods including lectures, interactive discussions, group activities,

simulations, and multimedia presentations. Participants were encouraged to actively take part and apply their learning in real or hypothetical PR situations.
