Night Vigil Prayer Service at St. Paul's Church, Kurseong lead by PP Fr Peter Jong Lepcha (SJ).



On the evening of Saturday, 7th June 2025, the faithful gathered at St. Paul's Church, Kurseong for a deeply moving Night Vigil Prayer Service, held in preparation for the Solemn Feast of Pentecost. The service commenced at 8:30 PM and continued through the night, marked by a spirit of devotion, reflection, and unity in prayer.

The vigil was a sacred time of spiritual preparation, commemorating the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles and the birth of the Church. The night was filled with adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, scripture readings, hymns, and faithsharing sessions, creating an atmosphere of grace and anticipation. Silent prayer and intercessions were also offered, invoking the Holy Spirit to renew hearts and strengthen the faith of all present.

The vigil culminated in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist at 4:30 AM on Sunday, 8th June 2025, ushering in Pentecost Sunday with joy and spiritual renewal. As the first light of dawn bathed Kurseong in serenity, the gathering dispersed, uplifted by the experience of a night spent in prayerful communion and awaiting the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

Useful tips for vibrant BEC's in Parishes:

An effective Pastoral Plan for Fostering Basic Ecclesial Communities (BECs) in a parish should focus on spiritual, organizational, and social dimensions to strengthen these small communities. Here's a structured approach:

Vision

"To build vibrant, Christ-centered Basic Ecclesial Communities as living expressions of the Church, fostering communion, participation, and mission."

Pastoral Plan

1. Formation and Education

- Conduct BEC Orientation Programs
- Train clergy, lay leaders, and parishioners on the concept, purpose, and importance of BECs.
- Ongoing Formation for Leaders
- Offer workshops and retreats to deepen leaders' spiritual, pastoral, and managerial skills.
- Scripture and Catechesis
- Promote Bible-sharing groups and catechetical sessions to deepen faith and foster a sense of community.

2. Evangelization and Mission

- Door-to-Door Evangelization
- Encourage BEC members to visit families to invite them to join, share the Gospel, and address spiritual needs.
- Incorporate Social Media
- Use digital platforms to share inspiring stories, updates, and resources about BEC activities.
- Celebrate BEC Sunday
- Dedicate a specific day to celebrate BECs with Mass, testimonies, and community-building activities.

3. Building Relationships and Collaboration

- Foster Unity with Parish and Diocese
- Strengthen the link between BECs, the parish, and diocesan activities for better coordination and support.
- Promote Inter-BEC Fellowship
- Organize gatherings, sports events, or retreats to build relationships between BECs in the diocese.
- Encourage Family Participation
- Ensure all members—youth, couples, and seniors feel included and valued.

4. Social Action and Outreach

- Address Local Needs
- Identify and address community needs, such as poverty

alleviation, education, and healthcare, through collective action.

- Disaster Preparedness and Relief
- Train BECs to serve as first responders in times of crisis or calamity.
- Environment Care
- Integrate programs like tree planting or waste management to foster stewardship of creation.

5. Spiritual Nourishment

- Regular Prayer Meetings
- Encourage weekly or bi-weekly gatherings for prayer, reflection, and sharing.
- Sacramental Life
- Ensure access to Mass, confession, and other sacraments within the community.
- Pilgrimages and Retreats
- Organize events to deepen the spiritual lives of BEC members.

6. Monitoring and Evaluation

- Establish a Parish BEC forum
- Create a dedicated team to oversee BEC development and provide resources and guidance in the parish.
- Set Clear Goals and Metrics
- Define targets such as the number of BECs to establish annually or the percentage of parishioners involved.
- Annual Assembly
- Hold an annual parish BEC assembly to review progress, share best practices, and plan future activities.

Key Elements for Success

- 1. Active Clergy Support: Regularly involve priests and religious in BEC activities.
- 2. *Empowered Lay Leaders*: Train and equip lay leaders for leadership roles.
- 3. *Inclusivity*: Ensure everyone feels welcome, especially marginalized members.
- Sustainability: Secure funding and resources for continuous growth.
- 5. *Prayers and the Holy Spirit*: Ground all activities in prayer and reliance on the Holy Spirit.

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Report on the Media Seminar Held at Divyavani

Date: 24th May 2025
Venue: Divyavani Communications Centre, Darjeeling

A one-day Media Seminar was successfully organized on 24th May 2025 at Divyavani Pastoral Centre, with the aim of equipping parish media cell members and youth leaders with foundational knowledge and skills in basic media communication and media ethics. The seminar was convened by the Diocesan Media Desk of the Catholic Diocese of Darjeeling under the leadership of the diocesan media Secretary.



Objectives of the Seminar:

To promote responsible and ethical use of media in church and community settings to build media literacy among lay volunteers to foster collaboration among parish media cells for more effective communication.

The seminar brought together 52 participants from various parishes, including media cell members, youth leaders, and catechists, all actively engaged in church communication work. Their presence reflected a shared commitment to making media a tool for evangelization and community engagement.

The day began with a prayer and Jubilee Song followed by opening remarks by Bishop Stephen Lepcha (via video) who welcomed the participants and emphasized the importance of media in today's mission of the Church.

Session I: Introduction to Media and Communication

Resource person Ms. Prashansa Caroline Rai, an educator and media expert delivered a dynamic presentation on the role of media in society and the Church, highlighting various forms of traditional and digital media and their influence on public opinion.

Session II: Media Laws and Ethics in the Indian Context

This session was conducted by Fr. Alexander Gurung. He explored key principles of media ethics, such as truthfulness,

responsibility, privacy, and respect for human dignity, especially in relation to Indian legal and cultural norms.

Session III. A talk on Pre-Production, Production and Post -

Production was conducted by Mr. Aditya Raya, Director of Darjeeling Television and a film maker. He taught the techniques of photography and editing.

Media in the context of Church in Darjeeling-Sikkim and Interactive Workshop.

This session was conducted by Mr. Mahindra Gurung who very succinctly explained the importance of media in evangelisation Participants were divided into groups for a hands-on workshop on writing basic news reports, taking effective photos, and using social media positively. Each group presented a short piece of news related to their parish, which was discussed and critiqued.

A lively panel discussion on "The Role of Youth in Church Media" featured young media volunteers from different parishes sharing their experiences, challenges, and aspirations.



The seminar concluded with a feedback session and concluding Mass .The inspiring sermon delivered by Fr.Francis Tamang encouraged all participants to be a "faithful witnesses in the digital world."

Outcomes of the seminar could be cited as, increased awareness about responsible media use, strengthened network of parish media cell members and new ideas and plans for collaborative media initiatives in the diocese.

The seminar proved to be a meaningful step toward building a media-literate Church community in the Darjeeling Diocese. Participants expressed their enthusiasm for more such training programs and committed to being "messengers of truth and light" through media.
